Parent and teacher check advised



- We've produced this HomeTalk on Palestine at the request of a subscriber.
- We think it is the right thing to do because many young people have shown that they have strong feelings about the situation in Palestine – and that they want to talk about it.
- We know it's a complicated issue that we can't possibly cover fully in a single HomeTalk, but we've tried to be balanced and non-judgemental.
- Our intention is to give you and your students an opportunity to think and talk about what it might be like to live in Palestine or Israel. It's more about empathising with personal experiences than analysing the politics of the situation. Of course, some schools or parents might want to go further and research or discuss more fundamental issues, but we'll leave that decision to you.
- We suggest that you look through the pack to check that you're comfortable sharing it with your children or students.
- We also suggest that you check with your school's leadership that they are comfortable with you addressing this topic.

The last 100 years in Palestine



- In 1922, after World War I, Britain was given the authority to govern Palestine.
- The non-Jewish Palestinians revolted against British rule several times.
- o In 1947, after World War II, Britain ended its control of Palestine.
 - The United Nations recommended dividing Palestine into an Arab state and a Jewish state, so that the Jews would have a homeland after the Holocaust.
 - o The recommendation led to a civil war, after which the state of Israel was formed.
 - Gaza came under Egyptian control; the West Bank under Jordanian control and 700,000 Palestinians were driven into exile.
- o After several wars and uprisings, Gaza and the West Bank came under Palestinian control in 1993.
- Over the last 30 years there has been conflict between Palestine and Israel, and several attempts to reach a
 peaceful settlement. These have not succeeded so far.







Talking Points

- What differences do you see between the way
 Nadeen and Edan live?
- What similarities do you see between the way Nadeen and Edan live?
- Do you think Nadeen and Edan would enjoy meeting each other?
- If you felt frightened, what sort of things would you do to manage your feelings?

Activity

- Imagine that you are living in either Palestine with Nadeen, or in Israel with Edan.
- Try to write a short journal, or even record a video, of what you think your day would consist of. What would you do? How might you feel? Who would you talk to?

Air strike on building in Gaza - Al Jazeera

Israeli missiles hit the Jala Tower in the Gaza Strip. This is a building housing television and newspaper journalists, as well as members of Hamas, a Palestinian military organisation. There was advance warning of the strikes, so no-one was killed.

Talking Points

- O Why do you think this building was bombed?
- To what extent did the advance warning make the attack more acceptable?
- Does it matter that this was a building used by journalists?
- Does advanced technology make wars more, or less, dangerous?

Activity

Imagine that you are having a serious quarrel with someone stronger than you:

- What could you do to stop it getting out of control?
- Who could you turn to for help to bring the quarrel to an end?

Talking Points


- What would it be like if rockets were being fired at your home or school?

- Why do disputes between countries sometimes escalate into violence and war?


Activity
